I am often asked what led me to want to become a rabbi? And while I could point to many things that shaped my choice such as my love of learning, serving God and the Jewish people, and hoping that after every day I could bring a little bit of goodness, justice, and love into our world - I would be remiss if I didn't include standing in wonder before life's big questions. Ever since I can remember I was filled with questions both big and small. Sometimes these questions were out of simple curiosity for how objects worked or what their function was but more often I was that crazy idealistic (or I admit annoying) child who wanted to know - but WHY?! The biggest questions for me seemed to cut to the heart of why there is injustice? hunger?, hate?, and suffering? Why are we here?, What is our purpose?, and What does it mean to live in the finite but feel the presence of the One who is Infinite? These are not the important and fascinating questions of science (which I thoroughly love) but instead questions of meaning. Why does living/life/it MATTER? Questions, which by their very nature lead not only to further questions but, often to the difficult realization that there may not be one answer (or any answers) or a logical consistency from one to the other.

Encouraged by my parents, teachers, and Rabbi Steven Tucker z"l to keep asking these questions no matter the lack of definitive answers, I was led to seek out others who grappled with the same questions. I found that the TaNaKh and its commentaries, the Talmud, the theologians and philosophers of our tradition from the past to the present all had these big questions too. I was not alone but instead a participant in a tradition that believes it a sacred and core act (responsibility) of faith to ask questions - *Mah Nishtana...*?

I soon learned that the key to understanding people and their responses, behaviors, or "answers" to life and the world around

them was to find out what their questions were. Even, admittedly when they didn't know they were responding to one (or many) of them. Judaism, and its spiritual path to living, seek not one answer to all of the big questions but a sensitization to the questions themselves. Judaism offers a way for us to find meaning(s) and live in a world continually changing and mysterious and yet fundamentally eternal and the same. As Jews, we are unafraid to ask questions and live without a definitive answer but, what we also understand is that our actions matter - living matters. Standing at Sinai, the Jewish people respond to God's Commandments with the famous words, "na'aseh v'nishma - we will do and we will understand!" Our Rabbis teach, that from the order of the words, we can learn that "doing (na'aseh)" takes priority even when we do not fully "understand (nishma)" why we do what we do. While this has been the modus operandi of Jewish life, our Sages also teach that we still need to try our best to find the meaning and understanding in what it is we do. Essentially both the keva (form - practice) and kavanna (intentionality and understanding).

To that end, starting in February I will be offering a class called, "The Hitchhikers Guide to Everything Jewish" which will explore some of the questions of the how, what, and why we do certain things as Jews. And while this class does have some basic framework of life-cycle, holidays, and rituals - the real "X" factor will be the questions of each participant. So here's to starting the secular year journeying together - unafraid to ask and explore the difficult questions of God, our tradition, and our lives.

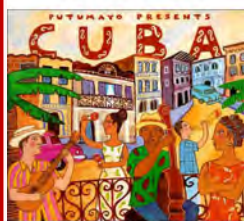

We are very pleased to announce that we will again be offering a Chair Supported Yoga class at Brith Sholom. Taught by Brith Sholom's own, Miriam Serow, the class will meet on Thursdays from Noon until 1:00 PM, with the first meeting scheduled for Thursday, January 12. The class will run for a total of ten weeks. The cost per participant for the ten sessions is \$90, or for those who prefer to pay week-by-week, the cost for each one hour session is \$10.50.

Chair Supported Yoga is suitable for people of all ages, abilities and disabilities. For those who are active and have a regular yoga practice or did in the past, the chair allows for deep and sustained full range of motion without the burden of full self-weight support. The chair also allows folks with no experience at all or with injuries or physical limitations to find their fullest range of motion in all joints and muscle groups safely within the limits of their restrictions. People with balance or stability issues can do this class as well as people with dizziness issues.

Yiddish Film Festival Opens with Glowing Reviews



Brith Sholom's Yiddish Film Festival opened December 4, 2016 with a showing of "Tevye". Produced in 1939, Tevye is the original, non-musical film version of the 1894 stories of "Tevye the Dairyman" by Sholom Aleichem, which much later inspired the Broadway play and film "Fiddler on the Roof". Featuring Maurice Schwartz in the title role, "Tevye" was the first non-English Language Film to have been deemed culturally significant by the United States Library of Congress and selected for preservation in the National Film Registry (1991).

The film's showing at Brith Sholom was accompanied by comments by Chris Josef Simmons, who discussed the background of the film, Maurice Schwartz's role as director and actor, and inside information on the production of "Tevye" and other Yiddish films made in the 1930's. According to Chris a few days after the film's showing at Brith Sholom, "I have rarely seen an audience view a film with such rapt attention - due primarily to the powerful performance of Maurice Schwartz as Tevye".

"Tevye" is the first presentation in Brith Sholom's Yiddish Film Festival. Other film showings are planned for 2017, so please stay tuned for information on upcoming dates and times.

Imagine yourself in a sidewalk café in Piraeus. The sun is setting over the Aegean as Shabbat approaches. You walk past the fishing boats moored in the harbor as you head home to your family. While the Jewish population in Athens was not the largest in Greece the community has strong ties to each other and celebrates its heritage as a family. After all, there have been Jews in Greece since at least the 4th century BCE.

The center of the Greek Jewish community before WWII was in Thessaloniki, the Macedonian capital. Tragically, there are a mere 8,000 Jews left in the country but we can still support the proud Sephardi memories and enjoy the deliciously healthful food.
